RE: Territorial Acknowledgement prior to council meetings

We were disappointed to read that Richmond Hill council declined to support a February 11, 2019 motion by Councillor David West to include a statement of Territorial Acknowledgement at the opening of council meetings.

Our family supports the motion and hopes that council will reconsider on March 25, 2019. The following is the rationale for our decision.

Richmond Hill is presently home to many different cultural and racial groups. This makes for a strong and vibrant community. However, for thousands of years before the Europeans and other cultural groups arrived here, the land was inhabited and cared for by the Wendat, Haudenosonee, and the Anishinaabe people. Acknowledging territory shows recognition and respect for Indigenous peoples in the past and the present day. We, as current citizens and decision makers, should acknowledge the stewardship role played by these peoples (our neighbours and friends).

In 2015 the Government of Canada produced the Truth and Reconciliation Report. As one of many calls to action for provincial and local governments, land acknowledgement is mentioned as a way to mark a small but important step in building a positive relationship with Indigenous peoples many whom still live in Richmond Hill.

The concept of a territorial acknowledgement may be new and unfamiliar to many. If Richmond Hill council supports this motion they will be in good company. The following is a partial listing of wide ranging groups who presently begin events and meetings with an appropriate acknowledgement.
