I am totally in agreement with you that proceeding with these planning applications should not be "business as usual" at this time. People should be given ample time to review the situation and possibly voice their opposition.

As a resident of 185 Oneida Crescent, I would express my opposition to these applications for the following reasons:

- 1) There are eight existing high rise buildings in this small area already. Three more are in or will be in construction shortly. By Richmond Hill standard, this is a high density that we residents do not feel comfortable with. Adding 4 more buildings will make the condition much worse.
- 2) There is a long-term care building and a school in this area which contribute to heavy traffics in peak hours. Four more buildings will definitely worsen the situation.
