1. Call to Order/National Anthem

The Mayor called the meeting to order at 9:30 a.m.

Council consented to recess the meeting between 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m.

11. Presentations

11.1 Presentation by Donald Hearn, Director, Recreation and Culture,
Michelle Dobbie, Manager, Park and Natural Heritage Planning, and
Karin Ash, Manager, Cultural Services, regarding Parks, Recreation and
Culture Plan Key Findings and Directions Report - (refer to Item 13.4)

Michelle Dobbie, Manager, Park and Natural Heritage Planning, began by advising that the review of the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan and Cultural Plan was initiated following direction from the City's Capital Sustainability Committee to advance the review to 2020 utilizing an integrated lifecycle planning approach. M. Dobbie noted the legislative importance of reviewing the three plans, reviewed the project timeline, and highlighted key changes in the community identified in the background research.

- M. Dobbie reviewed the key themes and findings of the Parks Plan which included:
- Parkland to Address Future Population Growth
- Responding to Parkland and Outdoor Recreation Facility Needs
- Strengthening Parkland Tools

Donald Hearn, Director, Recreation and Culture, presented the key themes and findings of the Recreation Plan which included:

- Developing New Indoor Recreation Facilities
- Optimizing the Use of Existing Recreation Facilities
- Enhancing the Delivery of Recreation Services and Programs

Karen Ash, Manager, Cultural Services, presented the key themes and findings of the Culture Plan which included:

- Leadership and Networking Equates to Sustainability and Inclusivity in the Culture Sector
- Fostering Growth in the Arts and Cultural Community
- The Changing Nature of Arts and Cultural Programming and Events
- Optimizing Places and Spaces for Arts and Culture

M. Dobbie concluded the presentation with a review of the recommendations of the staff report and next steps.

12. Delegations

12.1 Juni Yeung, 7 Leach Gate, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Juni Yeung, 7 Leach Gate, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. She shared her beliefs that the Plan seemed to be formulated from information collected before that pandemic, was based on a non-representative example of resident user responses from a Survey Monkey, and that it showed little to no preference to statistics on regional participation. Ms. Yeung shared her opinion that the underutilization of community centres was a symptom of access policies, as only Richmond Hill residents and organizations could book space at community centres. Ms. Yeung shared her hope that Council would promote the use of Richmond Hill facilities and smaller spaces to other regional groups and organizations.

12.2 Michael Bowcott, Richmond Hill Pickleball Network, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Michael Bowcott, Richmond Hill Pickleball Network, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report, and questioned whether the plan accurately represented the needs and wants of residents. Mr. Bowcott advised that pickleball was the fastest growing sport in North America, and that more pickleball courts were needed immediately due to its increasing popularity. Mr. Bowcott concluded by requesting that a motion be put forward to build a

world class multi-court complex in Richmond Hill that we all could all be proud of.

12.3 Jocelyn Lo, 350 Red Maple Road, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Jocelyn Lo, 350 Red Maple Road, submitted an application to appear as an electronic delegation to address Council on this matter but was not in attendance.

12.4 Rajshekhar Choudhary, 10 Pillar Rock Crescent, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Direction - (refer to Item 13.4)

Rajshekhar Choudhary, 10 Pillar Rock Crescent, submitted an application to appear as an electronic delegation to address Council on this matter but was not in attendance.

12.5 Brian Cave, 101-350 Red Maple Road, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Brian Cave, 101-350 Red Maple Road, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. He echoed the remarks made by the earlier speaker Michael Bowcott, and reiterated the need for more facilities for pickleball. He shared his belief that if Richmond Hill intended to cater facilities to females, youth and seniors, that pickleball was the perfect sport for those demographics. Mr. Cave shared his desire that Richmond Hill be the first to build a world-class facility for pickleball as it was a sport that was inclusive to everyone.

12.6 Matthew Bergman, Indigenous Action Committee, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Matthew Bergman, Indigenous Action Committee, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. He advised that the Indigenous community in Richmond Hill and York Region had an issue with lack of services and locations, and shared his belief that Richmond Hill was in a unique position to be the first city in York Region to provide those services. Mr. Bergman advised that the Committee was requesting that a motion be brought forward

with respect to the Eyer property being turned into a Native cultural centre. He shared the importance of a cultural centre, noted that it would have a positive impact on the Indigenous community and community at large, be the first of its kind in York Region, and set an example for all other cities in York Region and all municipalities. Mr. Bergman also requested that a plan of action be created to improve access to all municipal properties for the purpose of the Indigenous community.

12.7 Jay Shea, Indigenous Action Committee and Circle of Friendship Richmond Hill, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Jay Shea, Indigenous Action Committee and Circle of Friendship Richmond Hill, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. He advised that there were no services specifically designed for the Indigenous community in Richmond Hill and York Region, and noted the importance of creating greater access to activities, teachings, heritage and healing. Mr. Shea shared his hope that Richmond Hill help contribute to the healing of the Indigenous people by re-purposing the Eyer Homestead to create the first Indigenous cultural centre in York Region. He described the purpose of the centre, the proposed programming that would be run, and the benefits the facility would have on Indigenous youth.

12.8 Lutfi Askandar, KickOff GTA, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Cultural Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Lutfi Askandar, KickOff GTA, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Cultural Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. He shared his concerns related to the lack of indoor facilities for soccer in Richmond Hill, and noted that Richmond Hill players were forced to drive to other York Region municipalities to play as a result. Mr. Askander advised that indoor facilities were very difficult to book due to high demand, and shared his belief that a second dome was needed. He also shared his opinion that a new dome would generate a positive return on investment and enjoy the same success as the Richmond Green dome.

12.9 Paolo Volpe, 165 Richmond Street, regarding Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions - (refer to Item 13.4)

Paolo Volpe, 165 Richmond Street, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. He shared his concerns regarding the lack of indoor facilities for soccer in Richmond Hill, the difficulty in renting space, and the considerable amount of driving that was required to play in available fields in other districts. He advised of the significant talent in Richmond Hill, noting that KickOff GTA was the only club that had two kids chosen to represent Canada at the IberCup in Portugal. Mr. Volpe advised that soccer was the most watched and popular sport in the world, and that the City needed to act quickly to be at the forefront of the growing popularity, as the talent pool in Richmond Hill was large. He urged Council to invest in kids and invest in KickOff GTA as they had invested in the community, and help put Richmond Hill on the map by fostering the talent of our kids.

12.10 Debbie George, 1286302 Ontario Ltd. (Shirley Laneway Committee), 201 Shirley Drive, regarding the Member Motion submitted by Councillor Liu with respect to a report on assumption of the private laneway for freehold townhouses 141-247 Shirley Drive - (refer to Item 14.1)

Debbie George, 1286302 Ontario Ltd. (Shirley Laneway Committee), addressed Council regarding the Member Motion submitted by Councillor Liu with respect to a report on assumption of the private laneway for freehold townhouses at 141-247 Shirley Drive. She shared her hope for a positive outcome that would release them from the burden of maintaining the laneway. Ms. George advised that since they were not registered under the Condominium Act, the only recourse left to them was to be on par with other City-owned and operated laneways. She provided a brief history of the Shirley Drive Laneway, noted similar laneways owned and operated by the City, and shared findings of a report that outlined recommendations that required the builder to provide support to the community, which had never materialized. Ms. George also shared her belief that the budget required for the City to assume the laneway would be a reasonable addition when annexed to the current City laneway budgets.

12.11 Annie Li, 1286302 Ontario Ltd. (Shirley Laneway Committee), 195
Shirley Drive, regarding the Member Motion submitted by Councillor
Liu with respect to a report on assumption of the private laneway for
freehold townhouses 141-247 Shirley Drive - (refer to Item 14.1)

Annie Li, 1286302 Ontario Ltd. (Shirley Laneway Committee), addressed Council regarding the Member Motion submitted by Councillor Liu with respect to a report on assumption of the private laneway for freehold

townhouses at 141-247 Shirley Drive. She acknowledged that further discussion was required with the City to determine the best approach to achieving unity with other laneways in Richmond Hill. Ms. Li shared their preference that the City assume full ownership and responsibility of the laneway, with the conveyance of land and current individual easements being modified in order for the City to service and maintain the laneway. Ms. Li provided a site map of the laneway and listed several City-owned and operated rear laneways in Ward 3 and 6. She also shared 2021 service and maintenance costs related to the laneway and their 2022 budget.

12.12 Emmanuel Aranas, 50 Sapphire Drive, regarding Alectra Utilities Corporation (AUC) Hydro Power Supply for Site Plan Application D0619010 (Urbacon Properties Limited) - (refer to Item 13.2)

Emmanuel Aranas, 50 Sapphire Drive, addressed Council regarding Alectra Utilities Corporation (AUC) Hydro Power Supply for Site Plan Application D06-19010. Mr. Aranas shared the community's concerns regarding the impact the power lines may have on their quality of life, health, and the desirability of the community. He commented on the lack of communication with respect to how many transformers were required for the project, and expressed concern with the possibility that more megawatt capacity could be enabled in the future. Mr. Aranas advised that the community stood firm on their desire to have the polls relocated to the east side of Leslie Street, specifically that the line swing under Performance Drive, with the polls running on the east side of Leslie Street north to Elgin Mills Road, which would be accomplished by voting for Option 5.

12.13 Qi Zhang, 91 Sun Valley Drive, regarding Alectra Utilities Corporation (AUC) Hydro Power Supply for Site Plan Application D06-19010 (Urbacon Properties Limited) - (refer to Item 13.2)

Qi Zhang, 91 Sun Valley Drive, addressed Council regarding Alectra Utilities Corporation (AUC) Hydro Power Supply for Site Plan Application D06-19010. She shared concerns with the option of reducing pole heights and consolidating the streetlights, and shared her belief that costs to the residents were not being considered. She expressed concerns related to the electric magnetic field, noise generated by high voltages currents, and the loss of property values, quality of life and peace. She asked the City that should they support Option 4, that compensation be provided to the affected homeowners to allow them to purchase a similar quality home in the area. Ms. Zhang concluded by urging Council to select Option 5 which proposed the installation of the line on the east side of the street.

12.14 Karl Menezes, 43 Sapphire Drive, regarding Alectra Utilities Corporation (AUC) Hydro Power Supply for Site Plan Application D06-19010 (Urbacon Properties Limited) - (refer to Item 13.2)

Karl Menzes, 43 Sapphire Drive, addressed Council regarding Alectra Utilities Corporation (AUC) Hydro Power Supply for Site Plan Application D06-19010. Mr. Menzes advised that he was personally affected by the location of the poles as he had two poles just outside his property. He shared concerns with respect to the height of the poles, and the possible health impacts, and commented on the lack of communication between Alectra, Urbacon, the City and residents. Mr. Menzes noted that communication was not timely, and that it made it difficult for residents to respond appropriately. He advised that Town Halls have been ineffective, and concluded by requesting that the poles be moved to the other side of the road where no homes were situated, which would result in less health impacts.

12.15 Dean Graham, 29 Scott Drive, regarding the Noise By-law Amendment - (refer to Item 13.3)

Dean Graham, 29 Scott Drive, addressed Council regarding the Noise Bylaw Amendment. He provided a brief history of the building code with respect to the provisions that protected homeowners from noise. He advised of a complaint he made to the By-law Department regarding their neighbour's air conditioner unit, and outlined the actions that followed. Mr. Graham advised that the unit was deemed to be in compliance, even though it exceeded the allowable limits, as it had only run for 10 minutes on the day of the reading. He outlined further inaction by the By-law Department after additional complaints and the submission of a report prepared by an acoustical consultant. Mr. Graham outlined the impacts the noise has had on the enjoyment of their backyard and health, and notes his opposition to any changes to the current by-law.

12.16 Brian Chapnik, 110 Arnold Crescent, regarding the Noise By-law Amendment - (refer to Item 13.3)

Brian Chapnik, 110 Arnold Crescent, acoustical engineer, addressed Council regarding the Noise By-law Amendment. He acknowledged that the proposed Noise By-law was trying to address the variability of ambient noise levels, and shared concerns regarding the proposed target of ambient level plus five decibels. Mr. Chapnik shared his opinion that the proposal was not reasonable as it suggested that residents should have to listen to their neighbour's air conditioner as the dominant source of noise in their backyard. Mr. Chapnik shared his opinion that the five decibel increase on the ambient

level be denied, and detailed further recommendations in his correspondence submitted as Agenda Item 13.8.

12.17 Ashely Bergman, Indigenous Action Committee, regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report

Ashely Bergman, Indigenous Action Committee, addressed Council regarding the Parks Plan, Recreation Plan, and Culture Plan Review - Key Findings and Directions report. She advised that they had a vision of the services that could be provided in Richmond Hill, and that they wanted to capitalize on the often vacant and underutilized Eyer property by creating an Indigenous cultural centre. Ms. Bergman commented on the benefits of providing services to the indigenous community, and noted that their community was forced to travel outside the City to access services as they were not available in Richmond Hill.
